The Future of Health Care

Transforming the way we manage and communicate patient medical information

For more than a year, Scotland Health Care System has been working to migrate to a unified electronic medical record, called Epic. For the health care system, this is an enormous undertaking—both financially and in manpower.

“The health care system’s existing electronic medical record, Paragon, has been very successful, but we are now installing a new electronic medical record to be able to freely exchange patient information, reduce unnecessary paperwork, and reduce duplicate testing and time delays,” says Matt Pracht, Chief Financial Officer. “Epic brings a single source of information and, at the end of the day, we have to do things more efficiently.”

Scotland Health Care System’s conversion will take place at the beginning of February. Scotland Health Care System will install Epic at Scotland Memorial Hospital’s Patient Care Services, which includes the inpatient care units, outpatient services,

and the Emergency Center. It will also be installed at Scotland Urgent Care Center and Scotland Physicians Network practices, as well as at the offices of interested community physicians who are not employed by the health system but need an electronic medical record for their practices. Each practice will maintain its own records on individual patients. The networks, however, will have the ability to exchange data from those records for patients who consent.

Once the migration to Epic is completed, all of a patient’s information will be recorded on a single electronic medical record — and the patient will be able to access that record via a secure website, MyScotlandHealth.

Basically, a patient using a smartphone, tablet, or laptop will be able to view medical test results, schedule appointments, and pay bills.

A unified electronic medical record also gives health care providers instant access to patients’ medical records, meaning faster and more accurate diagnoses, elimination of duplicative paperwork and testing, higher quality care, and significant cost savings for patients, physicians, and other care providers.

Epic will allow Scotland Health Care System to operate more efficiently, lowering costs and saving money over time. Patients, meanwhile, will receive high-quality care.

Duke Hematology-Oncology Fellowship Program comes to Scotland Cancer Treatment Center

As a Duke Cancer affiliate, Scotland Cancer Treatment Center offers access to the latest cancer research and the most current training and staff education. All of this adds up to an enhanced quality of cancer care, right here in Scotland County.

Because of this strong affiliation, Duke has endorsed Scotland Cancer Treatment Center to be the first site outside Duke University Hospital to offer the Duke Hematology-Oncology Fellowship Program. Last year, Scotland Cancer Treatment Center added hematology-oncology fellow Dr. Andrea Sitlinger to its medical staff. Dr. Sitlinger completed her residency at Duke University and is interested in health disparities related to hematology-oncology. She will continue her fellowship program until later this year.

The Duke Hematology-Oncology Fellowship Program trains fellows to provide outstanding clinical training in all areas of hematology and medical oncology.

The first year of the hematology-oncology training program develops fellows' skills and experience in the comprehensive care of cancer patients and in the diagnosis and management of hematologic diseases. During their second year, fellows continue learning the scientific basis of hematology, hematopoiesis, and cancer pathogenesis, diagnosis, and management.

"It has been a wonderful experience, to complete my fellowship training here at Scotland, to work with highly experienced Duke physicians and staff. I've valued getting to know the patients and helping provide compassionate care here," Dr. Sitlinger says.

Duke oncologists understand the special needs of cancer patients and their families, and strive to translate clinical research findings into the most advanced therapies.

"The hematology-oncology fellows that are being trained at Duke are the cream of the crop of the next generation of oncologists." says Dr. Ivy Altomare, Duke oncologist at Scotland Center Treatment Center. Hundreds of applications were submitted, and Niki was one of 12 to receive this award.

The presentation of the Pinnacle Award is the highest award a teammate may receive. Pinnacle recognizes, rewards, and honors teammates who demonstrate extraordinary attention to our core values of Caring, Commitment, Integrity, and Teamwork, and who reinforce the importance of these behaviors to others.

Family Thanks Scotland ER for Saving Their Son's Life

When Hurricane Florence made an appearance in Scotland County in September, it caused devastation and destruction but also proved our community is stronger than any storm.

Jadon Olsen, a 17-year-old Scotland Christian Academy senior, started fighting for his life on September 17. Jadon and his father, Billy, a pastor at St. Luke United Methodist Church, were clearing storm debris to enable safe passage for other cars on the road when a tree limb fell on them.

The two were transported to Scotland Memorial Hospital (SMH), where Billy needed 12 staples in his head from the injury while Jadon suffered a brain bleed. Because of the storm Jadon had to wait to be transported to another facility, but the family says they are indebted to the emergency room doctor at Scotland.

"The initial ER doctor at Scotland Memorial Hospital is to be lauded as a hero," says Jadon's mother, Elaine Olsen. "He took great care of our son and kept him alive, tenaciously fighting for a chance to get Jadon where he needed to be. We are indebted to SMH for their care of our son."

Because of the weather, arranging transport was extremely difficult. Jadon eventually was transported to Carolina's Medical Center in Charlotte, where he underwent a three-hour surgery to stop

bleeding and relieve pressure on his brain. He was admitted into the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at Levine Children's Hospital and has since been released.

Once back home, the Scotland Memorial Emergency Room staff had a special visitor. Jadon came back to thank the physician, Dr. Brad Beckman,

who saved his life. The staff of Scotland Health Care System wishes for Jadon a full recovery and thanks the family for entrusting the care of their family to Scotland.

Take Steps to Prevent the Flu

If you're wondering whether you should get a flu shot, answer this simple question: Are you older than 6 months old?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends everyone past that tender age get an annual flu vaccination. The vaccine remains especially important for people at high risk for serious flu complications, those who live with them, and those who care for them. Individuals at high risk include young children; pregnant women; people 65 years and older; and people with asthma, diabetes, or heart and lung disease. In particular, those who care for children younger than 6 months of age should get the vaccine since infants are too young to be vaccinated.

The composition of this year's flu vaccine was updated to protect you against circulating flu viruses. There are two options for the flu vaccine: the traditional flu shot and a nasal

spray. Talk with your health care provider about which vaccine is best for you.

AVOID PASSING THE FLU

Flu viruses appear to spread from person to person through coughing, sneezing, or talking. It is also possible to get the flu by touching an object that has flu virus on it and then touching your mouth, eyes, or nose. To stop the spread of germs and avoid the flu:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue, then throw the tissue away.
- Don't touch your eyes, nose, or mouth.
- Try to stay away from sick people.

IF YOU GET THE FLU:

- Stay home and rest until your fever has been gone for at least 24 hours.
- Drink lots of fluids.
- Take over-the-counter pain relievers to ease fevers, headaches, muscle aches, and sore throats.

If you have a prolonged fever over 102 degrees, persistent vomiting, or very swollen glands in your neck or jaw, it's time to see a health care provider. You should also call your provider if any of these flu symptoms last more than 10 days or gets worse instead of better: fever, headache, chills and sweats, cough, muscle aches, or fatigue.
